### More Examples of Deception

1-1 page 4	Like a cloistress Olivia will mourn her brother and father for seven years at least until Cesario comes ‘round.
1-3 page 5	Sir Toby drinks so he can drink healths to his niece and will continue to do so as long as there is a passage in his throat and drink in Illyria.
1-5 page 10	Olivia tells Malvolio to get rid of the young man at the gate by telling him that she (Olivia) is sick or not at home.
1-5 page 10	Sir Toby enters staggering. He is obviously more than half-drunk, but blames the belching on pickle herring.
1-5 page 12	Olivia asks Maria to cover her face with a veil.
1-5 page 12	When Cesario asks Olivia if she is the lady of the house, Olivia answers, “Speak to me. I shall answer for her.”
1-5 page 12	Olivia asks Cesario if s/he is a comedian. Cesario swears, “I am not that I play.” It sounds ironic, but s/he is truthful.
1-5 page 15	Cesario reassures that his state is well. “I am a gentleman.” Which s/he surely is not.
1-5 page 16	Olivia instructs Malvolio to run after Cesario and give him back his ring. It was Olivia’s ring that was meant to entice him back.
2-2 page 17	When Malvolio tries to return the ring (which really belongs to Olivia), Cesario lies, “She took the ring of me. I’ll none of it.”
