

That of both of Brussels & Courmay are quite

 of Orange intended to make upon the 22nd assault
 the next day to which hee was oblig'd by the near
 approach of the Prince of Conde who having
 arriv'd all his ^{Garrisons} ~~troops~~ way come so near
 them as mount of the Trinity having nothing
 but Cannon & ammunition with him, that
 the Duke's party was to withdraw of French whilst
 the Duke made of attacke. The Confederates
 are in that apprehension of the Prince of Conde,
 coming that they begin to secure themselves
 with the Arcem Vallahois, & have sent most part
 of their baggage backe to Ghent. The Con-
